Pederick, Deputy Principal, managing student attendance Fingers crossed, watch this space! and I monitor this daily through information sent through from the Residential Campus each morning. If you have any questions regarding student attendance, please contact Lorraine or I. I thank you for your close attention to assisting your child to maintain the best possible attendance record and giving themselves the best possible opportunities into the future.

2015 has seen an overall increase in student numbers across the WACOA System of 11% with Morawa achieving a 48% increase. This of course will put pressure on resources and facilities that had been the result of a very targeted marketing program and I am very pleased with the result. Marketing will remain a strong focus with the aim to retain this increase in student numbers over time.

A developing focus for the Board and Ag Advisory, over the past six months has been the formation of subcommittees to oversee the further improvement of college facilities to cater for the increasing student numbers. A land purchase subcommittee has been formed to look into the purchase of a further 1,000ha of productive farming land to supplement the current land holding which includes about 1,800ha of salt lake country that is only able to carry stock for approximately one to two months each year. Jim Cook and Jim Milloy represent the Board, Peter Smith and Craig Topham represent the Ag Advisory Committee and Gavin Clark and I are the College members. Jim Cook and I will co-chair the group to ensure that all avenues are explored. A Building subcommittee is also being developed to look into the building of thirty to forty extra residential rooms and laundry facilities to enable the college to grow to 100 students and possibly cater for 10 DHS students. I thank these members of the college community for their guidance and work in advancing the college for the benefit of students and the region.

I was recently able to put a very strong case for the above at the Shire of Morawa Meeting, following the Opening of the Town Square and Freight Road to Minister for Regional Development Mr Terry Redman, and several other National Members for the Agricultural Region, Liberal MLC Brian Ellis and Chair, Murray Criddle and CEO, Gavin Treasure of the Midwest Development Commission. Lengthy discussion followed regarding the need for further land and residential rooms and included an admin and school building program. The Minister was receptive to the case and real interest was shown. Terry Redman also has a strong link with the College, being Head of Department, Agriculture and Trades, in the late 80's and going on to be Principal of Demark Memorial run by the Morawa/Gutha RSL. Thank you to College of Agriculture before entering Parliament.

The 2015 Student council led by Matthew Pyke and Holly Crowley, with assistance from Miss Gaunt and Mr Taylor, are doing a sensational job for the student body. Fundraising for the Canberra/Snowy Mountains/Old Tour early Term 3 has been a major priority. A couple of meals cooked at the Morawa Golf And Bowling Club and a Quiz Night last Friday evening which saw very good attendance and support from College Families, staff of both schools, and the community. mention must be made of Mr Matthew Purser who was an entertaining Quiz Master. With work well advanced for the combined Ball at the end of this week, staff and students have been very busy.

The 100 Year celebrations of the ANZAC landing at Gallipoli was marked with a combined Service at Morawa DHS with Student Councillors again heavily involved. College Captains, Holly and Matt, shared the MC role and attended to the flag, with Year 10 and 12 Councillors, Mike, Caitlyn, Alby and Ashley, laying wreaths and Year 10's, Jessica and Mikyla, reading a poem. In full dress uniform our students looked great and their behaviour was excellent. Thank you.

#### **CROPPING**

400 tonne of lime has been spread at the rate of 2 t per hectare. We have worked up a number of paddocks to help incorporate the lime and are getting good depth with the bar.

A number of students have had the opportunity to get in some extra tractor driving thanks to the early rain events.

Most paddocks have been sprayed for caltrop, tarvine 15mm = 105mm and small melons. The new Hardi Navigator 80ft boom 15mm = 135mm spray unit is proving to be a good purchase and is user friendly. All Agras Extra and Super phosphate has been carted.

> Dry seeding started on 20 April with three paddocks being sown to Brusher oats for hay, lupins were sown on the 29 and Sturt canola (to replace Tanami) is currently being sown.

There are a number of wheat trials earmarked for the college this year and these will give students the

opportunity to learn about different seeding and fertiliser Hand feeding of the ewes has commenced as paddock rates etc.

#### **CATTLE**

Mr Hook and students have started to break in the young bulls and heifers in preparation for upcoming shows. Students are shown how to handle and walk the cattle in the safest way possible along with washing and grooming of the cattle.

Calving has started with two Gelbvieh cross Brahman already born.

Heifer selection will be done in the near future and the culls will be either sold or grown out and put through the college abattoir for meat supply to the hostel.

#### SHEEP

Farm staff and students have been busy dismantling the old sheep yard panels at the rear of the shearing shed in preparation for the installation of the new Withnell stockyards that were purchased in late 2013. Hopefully we will commence installation over the next couple of weeks if the weather and seeding operations permit.

#### General Leave and Travel

The College provides transport ONLY on the assigned student travel days to and from Geraldton via Dongara for all boarder weekends and term breaks. Transport requirements outside normal authorised Department of Education scheduled travel days will incur an out of pocket cost to parents for fuel. Parents are asked if possible to make specialist appointments during term breaks. If for any reason you require your son or

daughter to leave during school hours, permission must be approved by the Principal.

#### General Health and Sickness

Students at all times must maintain the utmost of hygiene, as the poor actions of one can very quickly impact on others whilst living in a communal environment. Staff at the College are not General Physicians and are not able to make judgement about medical conditions. If requested by the student, or deemed necessary by the staff member, a doctor's appointment will be made. Students unwell will be confined to the Student Services to recuperate. Parents will be notified if this condition persists.

Parents, please ensure your son/daughter have the necessary items like soap, shampoo etc to maintain an acceptable level of hygiene.

#### **Bullying**

Bullying in the student community is a continuing concern for staff. Students are made aware of the issues of bullying through staff, written material and education courses, yet there are still students who fail to realise what they are doing in the name of fun. The traditional approach to controlling the bully with an aggressive intervention in the early stage has been replaced with "Choose Respect Code of Behaviour".

To **CHOOSE RESPECT** is to make a conscious effort to:

- Treat others with respect, no matter how they treat you.
- Treat yourself with respect.
- Forgive others who do not treat you with respect.
- Resist your natural desire to pay-back or take revenge.
- Apologise when you do not treat others with respect.
- Support others who are not being treated with respect.
- Ask for support when others do not treat you with respect.

Once again if your son/daughter feels this is happening please let staff know so we can deal with their concerns

#### Visitors to the Site

Parents will be aware that when visiting the residential campus they are required to 'sign in' this allows staff to accurately know the number of persons on site in the case of evacuation. It has recently been pointed out that this system is not working, highlighting a potential risk for us. Please remember, all parents to the residence are required to sign in before they move to the student dormitories. I'm sure parents will understand the need for heightened security and a record of visitors to our site, and we apologise for any inconvenience.

#### **Mobile Phones**

Mobile phones have many benefits, but they also pose many possible problems in a residential environment. Parents who wish to provide a student with a mobile phone, the following conditions apply:

- Students will not be permitted to carry mobile phones during normal instructional hours (during school).
- Phone calls can be made and received only during times designated as free or recreation time, not during meal times, or compulsory prep time, or where the use is likely to cause annoyance or inconvenience to others.
- Students with camera phones are reminded that it is illegal to photograph any person without their consent.

Parents and students are reminded that phones will be confiscated for one week each incident if breached.

#### **General Concern**

It would be appreciated if parents could please stay with your son/daughter until the College Bus arrives at the Train Station in Geraldton on the day we collect students. Our bus arrives at the Station approximately 2.30 pm for a 3 pm departure.

#### **Plant Production Systems**

#### Unique Student Identifer

From 1 January 2015 any student undertaking nationally recognised training by a registered training organisation information somewhere safe. needs to have a Unique Student Identifier (USI). The USI is linked to the National Vocational Education and Training (VET) Data Collection.

This means an individual's nationally recognised training and qualifications gained anywhere in Australia, from different training organisations, will be kept all together. When applying for a job or enrolling in further study, you often need to provide your training records and results.

One of the main benefits of the USI is that students will have easy access to their training records and results throughout life.

Mr Purser and the students are working together to create their USI's. Students are then required to complete their USI account setting-up process by creating their own password along with two check questions in case they forget it.

Given the strong likelihood of students forgetting their password and even the check questions, it might be

worthwhile if parents ask students to share their login information with them so that they too can store this information somewhere safe.
