

It gives me great pleasure to welcome the College Community to the 2015 school year. Following a very successful Marketing Program led by the College Board in 2013 and 2014, the College is FULL! With 72 Beds at the Residential Campus, 74 college students, including 6 day students and 2 MDHS residential students. A waiting list is now in operation. Students in Year 10 have been able to bus in from Perenjori, Three Springs and Mingenew and with the addition of a Yalgoo Bus run in 2015. The District High School Beds Program was always intended to remain in place while there were Residential positions available. I thank Maryanne and Nadine, College Marketing Officers, for a sensational year in 2014 resulting in pressure of places at the College this year.

A firm focus will remain on building and maintaining quality student numbers by the College Leadership Team. Many things have come together to result in the increased demand for places including the IPS rebranding and status,

an excellent, stable staff across teaching, farm and residential areas and the outstanding achievements of students and staff over the last couple of years that have been widely publicised and promoted. This of course includes the Colleges fine record of 100% Graduation over many years.

I publicly congratulate the year 12 class of 2014 on their fine achievements, 100% WACE Graduation and employment or further education or training placement. This class was great to work with and while there were some bumpy moments, the group as a whole made a fine contribution to the college. I wish them all every success for the future, especially the students who took the loss of their apprenticeships as part of the scholarship program in their stride.

We have had an excellent start to the 2015 academic year; there is a great vibe around the college and the standard of student behaviour and conduct has been very good. Classes are now running very

smoothly and changes required to the timetable have now settled. The extra student numbers have resulted in more Teaching FTE, and I welcome Ms Julie Burr and Miss Nadine Hollamby who are teaching Agriculture and thank them for the contribution that they have made already to our highly experienced teaching staff.

2015 has seen the re-introduction of ATAR classes with a large group of Year 11 students joining with Morawa DHS on Tuesdays and Thursdays for English and Math, and ATAR Plant and Animal Production Systems classes running at the college. A number of students are doing either 3 or 4 ATAR subjects, the largest group we have had in many years. While this puts a little extra pressure on students to ensure that they have all work completed and up to date, I remind students that Year 11 and 12 are busy years and students must ensure that they make a commitment to work hard to produce their best work and the best possible result on Graduation. Having said this, I have been very impressed so far with our ATAR students and their positive attitude and commitment to give their best.

I encourage you and your children/friends to like the College Facebook page, to stay connected with coming events and everyday happenings at the College. Students have signed permission for the use of photos in printed and online publications and this covers the Facebook page, however if you or your child don't wish to be part of this cyber communication, please email me to indicate this.

In December 2014 the College hosted the annual Ag Educators Conference in conjunction with DAFWA and the WA Colleges of Agriculture. Over 140 delegates took part in the event over two and a half days where nine concurrent sessions of Professional Learning were run. This was a great opportunity to showcase the college facilities, staff and student work and the agricultural industry of the northern

wheat belt. I thank all college staff and industry partners for their contribution to a very successful conference.

College Uniform – I remind all students and parents that the college uniform is mandatory for all students. Valuable time is wasted discussing uniform for a limited group of students who don't have all uniform items. All students must wear black leather school shoes (not VANS or similar), black belt, broad brimmed hat and the correct class or shed uniform. (Denim is not part of the uniform) Please contact Mrs Margaret Hogben if your son or daughter does not have all uniform items.

Mobile Phones - Phones are not to be taken to school. Students are welcome to use school phones for urgent calls when necessary. Phones will be confiscated for five days at both the Residential and School sites when this rule is not adhered to. I appreciate and thank you for your reinforcement of this message.

Hats - I remind students and parents that broad brimmed hats must be worn in Terms 1 and 4 and students must also have a water bottle for Farm and Shed days.

College Diary - It is expected that all students will have this with them at all times to help organise homework and study; it is also a requirement for leaving class.

We are already on the road to another very busy year where students have already gone to Adventure World and the Gin Gin Bull Sale. In the coming weeks we have School Photo's on Tuesday of week 6, Swimming Carnival on Friday of week 6 and the Harvey Ag Sports Carnival on the weekend of week 7. I remind students that while every endeavour is made to ensure that students have every possible opportunity, they must ensure that they remain up to date with class work.

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Firstly, a big welcome to all new and returning students and their families. The first month or so has been very busy but most students seem to have settled into the new school year very well.

OLNA testing is about to happen for most Year 10 students and some Year 11s. Under the New WACE, OLNA testing began for Year 10 last year. All students need to achieve Level 3 in OLNA (or have achieved Band 8 in NAPLAN in Year 9) to achieve graduation at the end of Year 12. We take our part in this very seriously and do our best to enable students to achieve this, if they have not already done so.

Year 11 students who attended the WACOA Morawa would have received a statement with their child's Semester Two report at the end of last year, stating their OLNA levels. If you have any questions, please phone or email to ask for any additional information you may need in this area.

Year 11 students have started on the "New WACE" syllabus for the four core classroom subjects, with collaboration with Morawa District High School to enable both schools to cater as well as possible for ATAR and Foundation levels in Maths and English.

CROPPING

350 tonne of lime has been carted using the college truck and has been spread at the rate of 2.5 t per hectare with more lime to be spread before seeding. The College cropping program has been completed by Craig Topham from Agrarian Management and myself. Varieties are the same as 2014 but we will be sowing Canola in 2015.

Paddock feed is very low and we have been forced to hand feed for a number of weeks now but with the recent rain events green feed should start to appear over the next few days and will take some pressure of our feed stocks.

CATTLE

All Gelbvieh Calves have been weaned and we will be culling a number of calves over the next week or so. Pregnancy testing of the Gelbvieh cows will be carried out soon and we are expecting to cull a

After a number of years away from the Gingin Bull Sale we have finally entered three bulls for auction. Mr McKenzie, Mr Hook and three year twelve students travelled to Gingin in the truck and ute on Wednesday the 4th March to prepare and help set up for the sale on Thursday. Mr Purser and Mrs Milloy -Rakich travelled on Thursday morning with the remaining year twelve students.

The three bulls were up for auction on the day and we finished up selling two for the prices of \$3750 and \$3000. Amy Matthew's parents were the winning bidders on Bull Mowag Jordan, paying \$3750. The Matthew's have had three daughters who have attended the College and they have been supporting the college by purchasing a number of bulls over these years.

95 Merino wether lambs sold for \$85 hd. During February we were lucky enough to have had two Trainers from Australian Wool Innovations deliver training to a number of Year Twelve students interested in shearing and wool handling.

Over three days the students had the opportunity to learn how to drag and shear, throw fleeces and class wool. A number of the students had participated in shearing in Year Eleven but needed to refine their skills.



PIGS

Porker sales to Hagan's Abattoir Geraldton are still holding steady and should continue over the coming months.

In mid-January we installed a Coolgro mist spray system in the sow shed and is set to come on every thirty minutes for four minutes once the temperature reaches 30c, and keeps the sows cool during the hottest parts of the day.

Twelve Gilts have been purchased from PIC Australia which should be delivered mid-March. The Gilts are

replacements for some of our ageing sows.

GENERAL

After many months of waiting we have finally received our new fertiliser/grain bin to replace the very old Jetstream 5 in 1 bin. The new bin is hydraulic driven, can hold more product and has better safety features.

We have also taken delivery of our new Hardi 4000 80ft Navigator Sprayer to replace the old Hardi 3500 60ft Navigator Sprayer.

General Behaviour

All students enrolling at the College must read and sign their acceptance of the Student Hand Book and understand that inappropriate behaviour will be dealt with according to the Management Student Behaviour policies.

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones have many benefits, but they also pose many possible problems in a residential situation. If parents wish to provide a student with a mobile phone, the following conditions apply:

- Students will not be permitted to carry mobile phones during normal instructional hours.
- Phone calls can be made and received only during times designated as free or recreation time, not during meal times, or compulsory prep time, or where the use is likely to cause annoyance or inconvenience to others.
- Students with camera phones are reminded that it is illegal to photograph any person without their consent.

Parents and students are reminded that phones will be confiscated for five days if students break this policy.

General Health and Sickness

Students at all times must maintain the utmost of hygiene, as the poor actions of one can very quickly impact on others whilst living in a communal environment. Staff at the College are not General Physicians and is not able to make judgements about medical conditions. If requested by the student, or deemed necessary by the staff member, a doctor's appointment will be made. Students, unwell, will be confined to the sick bay to recuperate. Parents will be notified if this condition persists.

Thefts

These are difficult to investigate while students allow other students in their dorms and fail to secure their rooms when unattended. I would like to remind parents that students have the opportunity to hand money into residential staff for safe keeping; this is placed in the student's personal file in a lockable cabinet.

Weekend Leave

I would like to remind parents that written permission must arrive at the college by no later than 9.00pm Thursday in the week of departure. Leave will not be approved in the following circumstances:

- Appropriate parental authority not forthcoming.
- Student is gated for disciplinary reasons.
- Students rostered on farm duty.

We know parents will support the college's policies and we realise there may be exceptions and will deal with these when the need arises.

General Leave and Travel

The college provides transport ONLY on the assigned student travel day to and from Geraldton via Dongara for all closed weekends and term breaks. Transport requirements outside normal authorised Department of Education scheduled travel days will incur an out of pocket cost to parents for fuel. Parents are asked if possible to make specialist appointments during term breaks. If for any reason you require your son/daughter to leave during school hours, permission must be approved by the Principal.


College Interstate Excursion

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I am looking forward to working with the students this year in the new workshop. During the Christmas/New Year break I spent some time talking with business owners about some of the new equipment we have in our workshop. They were impressed by the equipment that students were being inducted to use, and they gave me valuable feedback on what aspects of learning future employees need to be instructed in.

Currently the Year 12 students are either working on their major projects or completing various skill exercises which involve the use of specific machinery in the workshop. Also, the Year 12 students will be completing set theory work and will be practising their positional Arc Welding skills.



The Year 11 students will be completing a series of set projects which involve the use of the workshop machinery. The students will be inducted on the operational procedures and the PPE requirements for each of the machines. Also, the students will be given set welding exercises using the MIG welder. It is important that the students be able to set up the

MIG welder correctly to complete various welding tasks.

The Year 10 students will be inducted into using selected workshop equipment. The students will initially be given the opportunity to complete three set projects: a sheet metal tool box, a metal chipping hammer, and metal dice.

A new innovation this year will be "Student of the Month" for Engineering. Any student from Years 10, 11 & 12 is eligible for the award. The award will be given to a student who has demonstrated sound skills and has a positive work ethic in the workshop. The student will be presented with a certificate which will go in their personal file.

Contributions, Fees and Charges:

For those parents/care givers who have applied for the (SAS) Secondary Assistance Scheme and the Uniform Allowance, your payments have been applied to your child's billing account.

Boarding Away From Home Allowance (\$2105

BAHA): All families who have a student boarding at the Residential Campus are eligible for a BAHA allowance of \$2105. (This excludes those students who receive ABStudy Boarding). If you are in receipt of the (AIC) Assistance for Isolated Children allowance we require a copy of your statement you would have received from Centrelink and a signed application form. For those not receiving the AIC you are still eligible for an Agricultural Colleges Special Subsidy of \$2105. Please contact me at the college for an application form if you haven't already completed one.

All Boarding Parents please note that boarding fees payments are to be up to date as per arrangements by the end of Term 1 to enable boarders to return for Term 2.

Student Update Forms: This form is included in this envelope with your newsletter. Please check that all information is correct, make any necessary changes or additions, sign and return to the college by mail, fax or email.

Communication is the Key. Please keep us informed of your current contact details so we can keep in regular touch with you. Email is the preferred option of

communication due to the distance of families from the college. All staff have separate emails which are listed in their heading, in this newsletter.
