Policy

ACCEPTANCE DEPOSIT

A \$300 deposit is payable upon receipt of the Offer of Acceptance from the college. This is refundable depending on condition of room on leaving the college or at the end of Year 12.

RESIDENTIAL BOARDING FEES

Boarding fees are levied by the Department of Education on an annual basis. To assist parent/caregivers these are divided into three instalments, payable at the beginning of each of the first three terms. In 2026 these fees will be \$9,563.00.

First instalment \$3,188.00 - On or before 2nd February 2026
 Second instalment \$3,188.00 - On or before 20th April 2026
 Third instalment \$3,187.00 - On or before 20th July 2026

All instalments of residential fees must be cleared or a payment plan negotiated by 20th July 2026 for students to continue in residence in Semester Two. All subject and residential charges, contributions, requests must be paid in full by the end of Term 3.

If students are eligible for Assistance for Isolated Children Allowance and parent/caregivers have directed payments to the college, a copy of Services Australia's (formerly Centrelink) Summary of Payments must be provided to enable the necessary adjustments to student's fees.

Failure to clear all outstanding accounts from Year 10 or Year 11 will result in residency being denied at the commencement of Year 11 or Year 12 unless prior repayment arrangements have been made with the Principal. Payment plans should be in place. Student may attend the education programme as a day student should residential status be denied. If fees are not paid in full they will be referred to a debt collection agency for recovery.

BOARDING AGREEMENT

WA College of Agriculture - Morawa requires that all parent/caregivers read the Statement of Boarding document, complete the Boarding Agreement form and return it to the college.

REFUND POLICY

REFUND RESIDENTIAL BOARDING FEES

If a student leaves the college through their own choice or through termination of residency, fees remain payable for the number of weeks the student has been in residence. Parents will be refunded the excess, *if applicable*, on a pro rata basis.

REFUND COLLEGE CHARGES

If a student ceases the educational program at the college, pro rata charges less the percentage of any Government subsidy will be refunded to parents according to the time of the year. This calculated on a pro rata basis and is consistent with the Department of Education Fees Policies.

NO REFUND of fees is payable for any period of short term absence by a student from the college. Fee refunds for long term absences should be negotiated with the Principal.

DAY STUDENT AGREEMENT

WA College of Agriculture - Morawa requires that all parent/caregivers read the Statement of Day Student Fees document, complete the Agreement Form and return it to the college.

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

What is Vocational Education and Training at the college?

Vocational Education and Training is designed to prepare students of all ages for employment or further training. The qualifications, Certificates and Units of Competency (UoC) that students can achieve through VET programs are devised to meet the needs of the industry. VET provides training resulting in nationally recognised industry qualifications.

The VET system and the education system are distinct but complementary. The VET sector is industry driven, allowing industry to indicate the skills and knowledge needed, and the qualifications are linked to job roles. VET is lined up to identify industry skill requirements and skill shortage areas.

Horse Feed / Biosecurity

Equine Team Polo - optional

No hay is to be brought onto the college farm to comply with farm biosecurity. Agisted horses minimum hay requirements will be met inclusive of the horse agistment fee. Additional hay can be purchased by the college if required of which a charge per bale will apply. All other supplementary feed requirements are to be brought by the owner and stored within airtight feed bins in the provided garden shed.

Body Protector/Vest (Must be worn if students jump on site)

Use of College Horses

The college will provide access to a college owned horse during the school program for students who are not agisting. The term fee is inclusive of after-hours riding. Non-certificate students can use college owned horse's after-hours for a per ride fee. All after hours riding requires personal insurance. No one horse is allocated to a student and access is at the discretion of the Equine Trainer.

Horse Agistment

Having a horse agisted at the college allows your student access to their own horse during the equine program and after-hours. Your horse will be provided with a safe paddock, with secure facilities to store equine related equipment and feed. Privately owned horses are the sole responsibility of the owner and as such you are responsible for all health, veterinary, farriery and dental treatments - these will be paid directly to contractors. All horses will be wormed upon arrival to the college. The cost for agisting your horse at the college is inclusive of minimum hay requirements.

Financial Assistance

ASSISTANCE FOR ISOLATED CHILDREN (AIC)

AIC aims to assist the families of primary, secondary and under 16 year old tertiary students who are unable to attend an appropriate government school on a daily basis because of geographical isolation. Eligibility basics

- your child meets the living, age and study requirements; and one of the following
- your child is geographically isolated, or
- your child has a disability or special education need, or
- your child has no reasonable access to a government school

This financial assistance needs to be applied for through Centrelink (Services Australia). It is payable in four instalments at the beginning of each term. It is the college's preference that the AIC Allowance payment is made directly to the college.

Basic AIC payment rate:	\$ 10,338.00 - (not means tested)*
Additional AIC payment:	\$ 2,965.00 - (means tested)*
Maximum payment rate:	\$13,303.00 - (total of boarding fee)*

BOARDING AWAY FROM HOME ALLOWANCE (BAHA)

The Boarding Away from Home Allowance is only available to resident Western Australians who have qualified for the Commonwealth Government Assistance for Isolated Children (AIC) or Second Home Allowance which is available from Services Australia. More information about the AIC can be obtained by telephoning Services Australia on 132 318. The closing date for the Boarding Away From Home Allowance (for isolated children) is 27 November 2026.

The student must be enrolled in a Western Australian secondary school.

PAYMENT: The allowance for 2026 is \$1,461.00 for students who board away for the full year, with payment being made at the end of Term 4. Where a student only boards at the college for part of the year, a pro-rata payment will be made based on the number of terms attended.

The minimum stay with a Boarding Provider is four weeks for a pro-rata payment.

The payment/advice will be sent directly to the Western Australian College of Agriculture Morawa and is to be deducted from the residential boarding fees only.

Financial Assistance

BOARDING AWAY FROM HOME ALLOWANCE — (BAHA) AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES SPECIAL SUBSIDY (\$1461.00)

This allowance is to assist parents with secondary students attending and boarding at a Western Australian College of Agriculture.

Claimants apply for the subsidy through the Western Australian College of Agriculture where their child is boarding. The college will have application forms available on Enrolment Day. The closing date for the Agricultural College Special Subsidy Boarding Away from Home Allowance is 31 July 2026. Forms should be submitted direct to the agricultural college their child attends.

Applications must be completed annually. (An application does NOT automatically cover all school years).

ELIGIBILITY: Student is enrolled and boarding in a Western Australian College of Agriculture.

STUDENT SUBSIDISED TRAVEL SCHEME

The Student Travel Subsidy Scheme provides travel assistance to school and tertiary students who are geographically isolated. The two main types of travel support are:

- Subsidised fares for air, bus and train travel for eligible students who live within the defined remote area of Western Australia
- A road travel subsidy for eligible students who live anywhere within Western Australia but who must be driven in a private vehicle more than 56 km from home to the nearest:
 - Appropriate government school with boarding facilities (if boarding facilities are necessary)
 offering classes in the grade or level in which the student is enrolled, or
 - Regular passenger transport (bus stop, airport or train station please visit the Transwa Plan Your Journey website for regular passenger transport hubs and routes), or
 - A school bus service operating between the student's home and the school they are attending.

To be eligible, students must be an Australian citizen or hold a permanent residency visa and meet certain eligibility criteria. Further information is available by phoning 1300 660 147 or by logging onto: https://www.transport.wa.gov.au/about-us/grants-subsidies/student-travel

Financial Assistance

SECONDARY ASSISTANCE SCHEME

The State Government, through the Department of Education, provides financial support to eligible parents through the Secondary Assistance Scheme (SAS). The aim of this scheme is to assist low income families with secondary schooling costs.

SAS comprises of two allowances (as per below):

Clothing Allowance	\$115.00	Paid directly to the parent or the parent can nominate payment directly to the college; and
Educational Program Allowance	\$235.00	Paid directly to the college

To be eligible for the scheme, the parent or guardian must hold at least one of these concession cards:

- Centrelink Health Care Card
- Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card
- Veterans' Affairs Pensioner Concession Card (blue card).

The concession card must:

- be valid for at least 4 weeks
- be valid for some time within Term 1, 2026 (2nd February to 2nd April 2026)
- have the student listed on it
- not be expired at the time of applying for SAS.

Please bring your Concession Card with you on Enrolment Day. There will be an application form for you to complete to collect the subsidies relating to these cards.

Applications must be completed on Enrolment Day.
